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

COUNTY LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES RECEIVE BODY-CAMERA GRANTS

ASHTABULA AND LAKE COUNTIES - Several local law enforce ment agencies received grants to help defray the expenses of existing body-worn camera programs, according to a press release from Gov Mike DeWine's office on Friday, Jan. 12.

The Ashtabula County Sheriff's Office, as well as the Conneaut and Geneva police departments, were named among \$4.8 million in grant recipients in a program designed to aid local law enforcement agencies across Ohio to cover costs associated with body-worn camera programs.

The Ashtabula County Sheriff's Office received the largest grant locally - \$50,620.79 to help implement an existing program and to cover the expense of switching to a new service provider, according to Stacy Millberg, public information officer with the sheriff's office.

MAN WANTED IN **2016 FAIRPORT** HARBOR BOATING DEATH ARRESTED

MIAMI, Fla. - Alen Gorishti, suspected in the 2016 killing of Roger Burton, was arrested by the U.S. Marshals Service in the early morning hours of Sunday, Jan. 14, during a stopover in Miami while flying from Columbia to Canada.

Gorishti, 33, of Ontario, was wanted by the U.S. Coast Guard for a boating incident that resulted in the death of Roger Burton, a local fisherman, according to a press release from the U.S. Marshal's Service. On Nov. 6, 2016, a motor vessel

operated by Gorishti collided with another boat that was anchored approximately two miles off the coast of Fairport Harbor. Two men were aboard the second boat at the time of the collision.

Nominees were submitted by members of the community. All were required to live in Lake County and fall between the ages of 21 to 40 years of age during the year ending Dec. 31, 2023.

The winners were determined by a rubric scoring process based on their work and achievements in four areas: leadership, community involvement, entrepreneurship and professional accomplishment. The evaluation and scoring process maintained anonymity by keeping nominees and their nominators undisclosed.
